The actress Sarah Siddons was Jane Austen's favourite actor. The Sarah Siddons Fan Club Theatre was named in her honour and is delighted to be supporting a range of heritage events that are being organised to celebrate Jane Austen's 250th Birthday!



Jane Austen visited Southampton as a seven-year-old schoolgirl, as a seventeen-year-old teenager and moved to the town in 1806 as a mature woman on the cusp of becoming a well-known author.

The Southampton year-long programme will reflect on Jane's life in the town, and the influences the town and its inhabitants had on her writing.

2025 is the 280th birthday of son of Southampton Charles Dibdin, as well as the 250th birthday of the town's most famous resident, Jane Austen. Austen hired a piano whilst she lived in Southampton on which to play the tunes of one of her favourite composers, Charles Dibdin.

This performance celebrates Austen's Dibdin with a performance of his popular songs, which Austen loved and sang, brought to life by talented local folk musician Jeff Henry. Accompanying Jeff will be historian Nicola Pritchard-Pink, who shares insights into Austen's song collection, revealing what performing Dibdin's lively show songs at home might have been like for this famous author.



The setting for this concert is the historic medieval church of St Michaels, the oldest building within the old town dating from 1070 and well-known for its musical output and concerts. Guides will be on hand to highlight the history of the church.

A maritime cruise on the Shieldhall. Water parties and yachting were favourite pastimes during Jane's time in Southampton and she took trips to Hythe and Netley. Her landlord, the marquis of Lansdowne, almost drowned when his catamaran capsized, the friends of Austen, the Lances, also had a shock when their family yacht foundered!

Relive some of Jane's trips with an excursion on Steamship Shieldhall, which is also celebrating a birthday this year, 70 years young!

The cruise will pass down Southampton Water, into the Solent and will then enter Portsmouth Harbour, before returning to her Southampton berth.

The Shieldhall Padre will be on board to conduct a Merchant Navy Day Service.

Jane Austen's circle of friends and neighbours included Ann Newell - her next-door neighbour, an absentee landowner of plantations and slaves, Charlotte Fitzhugh, who married into a wealthy East India Company family and was a superfan of Austen's favourite actress Sarah Siddons and Anne Middleton, the mixed-race plantation heiress born in Jamaica, who married in India and who had her private life splashed across national newspapers. Women who could easily find themselves portrayed among the characters found within the pages of Mansfield Park, Emma and Sanditon. Descendants have loaned items from family archives to provide new and largely unseen material linked to Austen and her networks, including the Austen Family Household Book.

The historic Pear Tree Church was opened in 1620. By the eighteenth century it was the most fashionable church in Southampton, said to be the inspiration for Thomas Grey's Elogy in a Country Churchyard.

Elizabeth Butler Harrison, cousin to Jane Austen, was a member of the congregation. Jane stayed with the family when she was seventeen and stood as god-mother to her cousin's eldest daughter, Elizabeth Matilda Butler Harrison.

Visit the Austen family memorial and the exhibition on the history of the church used by the Austen family. You can also sit on the writer's bench commissioned to commemorate Austen's link with the Church, and enjoy an afternoon talk on Jane & Peartree at 2.30pm.

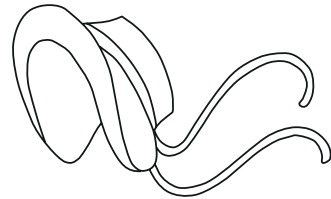

JANE AUSTEN WALKING FESTIVAL

"I walk. I prefer walking"

Walking became very popular in the eighteenth century, doctors promoted it for health reasons, fashionable leaders of society liked to be seen strolling – they were known as loungers – although Elizabeth Austen described the Duchess of Devonshire and her sister as being: “dressed like their maids” and that they “strolled about Southampton like showmen.” The passion for the picturesque encouraged walks in the countryside, and the obsession with the gothic led visitors to medieval ruins. Jane Austen, like her most well-known heroine Lizzie Bennet, liked a long walk, such as the five miles she travelled to visit her friends the Lances.

The Southampton Jane Austen Walking Festival has embraced all these themes, you can join us as a ‘lounger’, as a Lizzie Bennet, or just for the pleasure of a healthy walk.

Walking tour with The Friends of Southampton Old Cemetery.

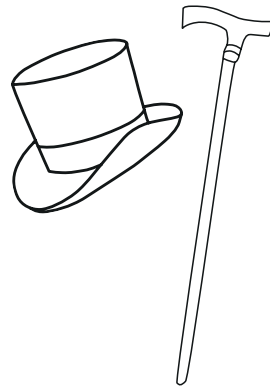

This is a 5-mile circular walk, with a stop at lunchtime to view Peartree Church.

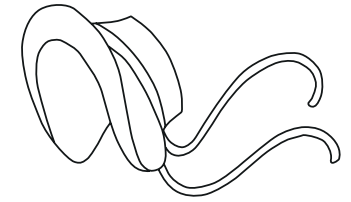
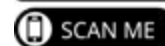

Costumed Guided Walk of Maritime Bursledon, with Hamble Valley Guides

11am -12.30pm

Starting point: Bursledon Station carpark

A walk around the picturesque riverside village of Bursledon that celebrates the Austen family's Naval links; including the ship building yard that produced HMS Elephant, (whose notable captains include Admiral Lord Nelson and Frank Austen), and Brooklands, the home of Admiral Thomas Williams, husband of Jane Austen's cousin, Jane Cooper, and a visit to St Leonards church, where the builder of HMS Elephant, George Parsons, has a memorial.

Our guide will be dressed in beautifully recreated Georgian costume to lead this stroll around the beautiful village of Bursledon, which was largely rebuilt in the eighteenth century following a disastrous fire.

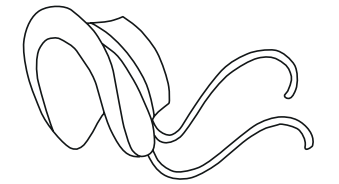

The Sarah Siddons Fan Club Theatre has been proud to support Jane Austen 250, both with our own events and also working with other arts and heritage partners. As we say a fond farewell to Miss Austen on the day of her 250th Birthday we would welcome you to join us for an evening of rehearsed readings and dramatized interludes from the pen of Jane Austen.



The Mason's Hall is on the corner of Albion Place, originally the sight of a parade of houses designed by the architect John Plaw and a minute away from Jane Austen's home on Castle Square. The plot was originally the home of Colonel Powlett and his wife Laetitia who Jane mentions in her letters, due to Mrs Powlett's scandalous affair with Lord Sackville. The houses were destroyed in the Second World War, the Mason Hall was built in 1879, and exhibits a display of mason memorabilia
